### **Welcome to Blue Skies 2023!**

Welcome to this year's Blue Skies Music Festival! This is the 50th Blue Skies so it's very special. As always, there will be wonderful music and lots of magic. It all begins with how we treat each other—being neighbourly, showing respect, care, and kindness, and lending a hand to those who might need it.

The Info Booth is a welcoming place to get answers to your questions, open day and night. The friendly volunteers at the Info Booth will help connect you with Security, First Aid, or anyone else when you need help. Need assistance, or need to ask a question? Wander over to the Info Booth and they will be glad to lend a hand. This is where you can check lost and found, sign up for the mailing list, and sign up to volunteer!

#### Safe 'n' Sound

Blue Skies is a special place but sometimes things may go a little off. If you experience or witness harmful behaviour, you're encouraged to ask for it to stop, to intervene if it is safe to do so, and to communicate the situation to Security as soon as you can. The Security team will follow up and remain involved until it's resolved. If there's any situation at all where you want another person to get involved, the Info Booth is the place to go. Security folks, wearing BRIGHT RED Blue Skies T-shirts, are always available, and are at the Gate and lit-up Info Booth all night.

#### **First Aid**

First Aid is at the top of the hill, beside the Info Booth. We are **not** a **medical clinic but we can offer first aid support** for minor injuries and ailments, plus help support folks with bigger concerns to get the help they need. **We are open from 8:00 am to 6:00 pm.** For after-hours emergencies, locate Security (wearing bright red Blue Skies T-shirts) to contact First Aid support. For emergencies, call 911 and contact Security. The Blue Skies road address is **2439 Clarendon Road**.

Please bring all of your regular medications, including Epi-pens if you have anaphylactic allergies. To charge CPAP machines, the recycling area has a few outlets and folks monitoring them (please respect the outlets for medical needs). A special note — **First Aid volunteers will be wearing masks and anyone coming to First Aid will need to wear a mask** — we have extra masks if needed. Wearing a mask remains an important way to keep everyone safe when physical distancing is not an option.

#### **Land Acknowledgement**

We begin our Blue Skies Music Festival by acknowledging that we are gathering on the unceded homeland of the Algonquin Anishinabeg people.

We acknowledge that the ancestors of Blue Skies' Indigenous neighbours were forced to take refuge in this



region almost two centuries ago. They were marginalized as settlers and loggers squatted on, seized and expropriated their traditional hunting and trapping territory throughout the vast Ottawa Valley.

We acknowledge the racism, erasure and cultural genocide in the treatment of the Algonquin Anishinabeg and other Indigenous peoples by Canadian governments and settler society throughout history and into the present day.

We honour the wise Indigenous teachings, as we strive to live in a more ecologically sustainable way. We honour the Algonquin Anishinabeg traditional way of living in and seeing the world, anchoring each person in strong relationships, stretching back through their ancestors, encompassing all living relations, and looking ahead to the unborn generations who will follow us.

The traditional way emphasizes the importance of how we treat each other as the best way to help us learn behaviour and actions that promote harmony and balance within ourselves, our families, our community and the natural world. This is what the Seven Grandfather Teachings seek to do - encourage respectful behaviour, humility, honesty, bravery, love, wisdom, and truth so that every individual has the knowledge and tools needed to act in good ways.

Indigenous wisdom teaches that our responsibility as humans is to give thanks every day, to put our minds together as one and give greetings to all the peoples of the earth. May our time together here at Blue Skies be guided and blessed.

Blue Skies is proud to be a member of **Folk Music Ontario**, supporting the growth of a thriving and inclusive folk music community.



#### **Volunteering at Blue Skies**

You folks are so lucky. Here you

are at Blue Skies, an amazing summertime camping and music weekend and it isn't costing you an arm and a leg. How is that possible? Start asking around and most folks will say that Blue Skies being volunteer-run has a lot to



do with it. But we do things differently at Blue Skies. Volunteering here gives you a chance to (1) meet new folks and (2) lend a hand. Helping out is obviously important because that's how stuff gets done. But meeting new folks and connecting with them is the glue that makes Blue Skies REALLY special. So get off your duff, go up to the Info Booth, and they'll show you places around the festival where you can meet new folks and

help us all out. It's a BIG two-for.

Do you know why Blue Skies has no private sales? It's because from the beginning this weekend has always been about music and not making money. The goal has always been to do things for as little money as possible, with everyone helping make it happen and with everyone participating. (The very first stage was built by *volunteers* using wood



salvaged from a derelict barn.) Blue Skies is "a space for things to happen", a place where things organize themselves, where you get to be creative, where we trust each other. The unwritten agreement is that you come here, you give your energy and you help make it happen.

So, go to the Info Booth and talk with a Volunteer Coordinator. They have a broad view of what's going on, where extra help might be needed and where you could fit in. Best of all, they can find places suitable for any age or ability, so adults with kids can volunteer together. How neat is that? Make yourself useful and soon people will be asking you what to do. Be patient and get ready to have some laughs. You'll figure it out and the magic will happen before you know it. Note - we have a new wrinkle this year. All volunteers over age 18 need to become familiar with how to assist people with disabilities. (See page 78 for details.)

## The 50-year celebration



It's *still* happening folks, 49 years after the *first* Blue Skies. Nowadays,



most folks probably just *assume* Blue Skies was always like it is today. Far from it. Try to imagine a Blue Skies with no electricity so no speakers on the stage, just acoustic instruments—no ice and no popsicles! Imagine a Blue Skies with no well, so you hauled in all your water, a Blue Skies with no tickets, (so how do you pay the performers?). You get the drift. In the beginning things were *really* basic and primitive.

It all began with Oskar Graf calling together about a dozen folks from the area, people scattered from Lanark to Arden, Ompah to Perth, Brooke Valley to Sharbot Lake. As Oskar recalls, "The thinking was 'let's live simply in the country, grow our own food and figure out what we really need to be comfortable (in a house without water or electricity north of Hwy. 7)'." There were lots of artisans, organic gardeners, vegetarians and builders, fixing up and living in old abandoned farmsteads and cabins without running water and electricity, living in self-imposed poverty and driving beat-up cars—building their own places and redefining the pioneer lifestyle.

Oskar's idea was to put on a community music show, invite the locals, and make it non-commercial. This was going to be a weekend where no one was hustling, it was only about music and enjoying each other. And it was also about pitching in and helping make it happen. Fifty years later, we're still collectively figuring out how to do it, making space and welcoming newcomers, trying to balance keeping tickets affordable, while trying to pay musicians as much as we can.

Part of this year's special celebration is a contest to tell a Blue Skies story in just six words. We began collecting six-word stories last year and have sprinkled them throughout the pages of this program. Why not try and tell your Blue Skies story? Let your creativity shine, and have fun. Stories dropped off at the Info Booth by 4 pm on Saturday just *might* be performed live on stage, on Saturday or Sunday.


#### **Our Famous Blue Skies Loos**

Blue Skies' outhouses are known throughout the civilized world as the sweetest and most hygienic loos ever! Please help us maintain these

high standards.

• Use the "**one poop, one scoop** method" (one scoop of sawdust).

- Close the lid once you are done. It helps the loo vent properly and makes tomorrow's visit so much more pleasant-ish.
- Don't put anything down the hole with a half-life longer than a week, such as beer cans, sanitary products, baby wipes, or underwear (yes, you read *that* correctly).
- Volunteer for a sanitation shift; it's a quick and easy way to contribute to the festival! Give your loo cleaning volunteers your love and gratitude when your



sanitizer available, it's a smart thing to set up a hand-washing station at your own campsite or bring your own preferred cleaning products: such as hand sanitizer, wipes or wet cloths. Just remember—that all garbage must be taken home with you.

• We try, to the best of our ability, to provide a safe, clean environment for all attendees and in that effort **we do suggest using all precautions** to make yourself feel comfortable, like wearing a mask and providing enough personal space while waiting in line.

#### **Fire Safety**

We sometimes have a **fire ban** in effect during the festival weekend. We won't know until the festival, but it can and does happen so be prepared. If so, that means **no open flames**, nada, no candles and no campfires. Cookstoves are permitted but **must be carefully monitored**.

We sure hope there isn't a fire ban because we have several communal fire pits scattered around the site. They're great for cooking on, jamming around and generally getting together and meeting your neighbours.

**VERY IMPORTANT - Never start a fire at a communal fire pit and walk away.** Someone always HAS to be looking after any fire. The same goes for cook stoves and other flame sources.

**Fire safety is really important.** Never leave any flame unattended or drop a cigarette butt on the ground. **A fire will ruin everyone's Blue Skies experience.** 

#### **Peaceful Happy Festival**

#### Shhh ... Quiet Areas

The communal fire pit nearest the stage will accommodate late-night revellers. Away from there, it's less noisy. Sleepy Hollow is the quiet camping area between the stage and gate house. **Here we request no noise or boisterous singing**, but—quiet conversation and soft music are welcome.

But quiet area or not, please remember, your neighbour will be a happier camper after some sleep. If your neighbour is more boisterous than you would wish, try asking them to tone it down. A gentle request goes a long way.

Mike McNerney began performing and recording his original music as a teenager in 1962. Although he gave up his professional music career in 1966, he has never stopped making music. Mike performed as a tweener at the very first Blue Skies and has dug outhouses and volunteered for garbage duty!

#### Rebecca Campbell

A dear friend to Blue Skies, Rebecca Campbell is a freelance singer, musician, arranger, and sometimes songwriter. She plays Stella guitar, percussion, harmonica, and melodica but mostly she sings, moving deftly from up front to backup. During the pandemic, Blue Skies reprinted some of the past T-shirt designs as a fundraiser to pay musicians to perform at the free virtual festival. Here are what two previous T-shirt designers told us.

Rebecca Barclay, designer of the 1991 T-shirt: "The healing, and living earth stewardship workshops at Blue Skies festival made a big impression on me the first time I visited about 40 years ago. This design was first created for the 1991 year of the festival, and an eco-sphere full of mother trees, on a living planet seemed to me a good context for the T-shirt background. Then it's about elements of community. I tried to capture the dancers, always brilliant, including the small kids who storm the front of the main stage. My lettering was inspired by my first ever album I received, and of course, what music festival doesn't have a fiddler?"

Kathleen Dorner, designer of the 1987 T-shirt: "The 1987 T-shirt design was inspired by that part of Blue Skies that happens after the blue sky darkens, the campfires are lit, and the sharing of music continues long into the night. My first experience of Blue Skies was in 1982, when each camp had its own little fire. Danny and I arrived after dark, and as we wandered from fire to fire looking for friends who had set up a tent for us, we were welcomed at each campfire by total strangers who offered us hospitality and music... it was a magical experience."



# Workshops

The holistic workshops are a whole different world and over the past 40-plus years have covered an astounding range of topics, from the elegant simplicity of flowers to tapping into the eternal echoes of our internal songs. 





# **The Stars Overhead**

North

19 Dippe

There are some real advantages to Blue Skies being way out in the bush. Like the dark night sky can give city monkeys the chance to look up and literally see with their own eyes into the vast depths of space and time. How neat is that?

If (a BIG if) there are clear skies during the festival evenings - no cloud cover or rain clouds, no wildfire haze - the sun will be setting in the west around 8:30 pm. The moon rises above the horizon after 10:30 pm so the hours before then will be best for star and planet gazing.

The brightest objects in the sky are the planets and their orbit is along an elliptical arc that hangs close to the southern horizon. The brightest planet, Venus, sets at sunset, but Mars is above the south-west horizon until 9:30 pm when Saturn rises in the east and Saturn should be easily visible by 10 pm.

The single brightest star in the sky is Arcturus, hanging low below the handle of the Big Dipper. In terms of recognizable constellations or star patterns, the three most recognizable are probably the Big Dipper, Cassiopeia and the Summer Triangle. The Summer Triangle should be easily sighted in the centre of the sky with its three bright stars - Deneb, Vega and Altair.

Cassiopeia, an inverted W, hangs high in the sky above it. The Big Dipper, a pot with a handle. dominates the western side of the sky. A line from the "pointer" stars at the end of the Big Dipper pot leads your eye across the sky to Polaris. the North Star.

If the skies are really clear, the enormous arc of our galaxy, the Milky Way and its 400 billion stars, will be splayed across the sky from south to north, and here you can peer into the centre of our galaxy, some 27 thousand light years away.

Andromeda is our nearest neighbouring galaxy and it is sometimes visible to the naked eye as a small blur of light to the north-east of Cassiopeia. The light you see from Andromeda is taking about 2.5 million years to reach our eyes. And this is just what is visible. Astronomers now tell us the amount of what they call "dark matter" in the heavens dwarfs what is visible. Man, oh man.

# **Blue Skies BioBlitz 2023**

BioBlitzes are short, intensive ecological surveys of biodiversity and species. Call it a form of Citizen Science — in Blue Skies' case, a way for The Land Council to find out about the ecological dimensions of the festival land and gain a broader perspective, seeing the land as more than a camping site for a once-a-year music festival.

Long-time Blue Skies-er Tom Whillans (whom most of us call 'Art' at Blue Skies where he has spent the past nine years handling Magoo's stage announcements) is a Professor at Trent University, where he specializes in ecosystem degradation and rehabilitation, and teaches an experiential course in stuff like BioBlitzes. Art approached The Land Council about using Blue Skies as a project location and recruited five of his students to design the Blue Skies BioBlitz, which took place two months ago, on June 3. Sixteen Blue Skies folks volunteered for the exercise, including Land Council members Linda Rush, Randy Roels and Jean Sharp.



plants and insects along six upland routes, four wetland routes, and two festival site routes. Logs were overturned for salamanders; vegetation was swept with insect/invertebrate nets in the air and in water; pit traps were used to sample ground beetles; plus other animal observations were noted. A visual and auditory survey of birds was part of the survey. The identifications were recorded in iNaturalist, and eBird, and on paper.



This corner of the Canadian Shield that Blue Skies sits on is rugged and hummocky, a region of thin soils and exposed bedrock, marked by numerous small wetlands interspersed by hundreds of streams. Water is key to life, so particular attention in the BioBlitz was paid to wetland environments, ranging from swamps to wet meadows and riparian wetlands, and including seasonal water pools found at the back of the property, as well as the connections to adjacent wetlands outside the property.

In Blue Skies' case, these wetlands drain towards the southeast for a few kilometres to MacPherson Road and then drain northeast, eventually

becoming Bolton Creek and emptying into the Mississippi River at Fall River.

The findings of the BioBlitz are still being processed. An update may be available by festival time. Check at the Info Booth. What happens next is up to Blue Skies and The Land Council. This could include protection of certain valuable or sensitive ecological features, a plan for replacing trees when they are destroyed by storms or disease, ways of enhancing the habitat for preferred species, priorities for carbon sequestration, and collaboration with adjacent landowners. Since the land was stripped of its valuable pine timber 150 years ago, it has been largely neglected. Now may be the time to put effort and thought towards rehabilitation.

# Blue Skies in the Community Making Music Happen

Blue Skies in the Community has had a fantastic year. Like the festival itself, **Blue Skies in the Community (BSIC)** is run by a dedicated team of volunteers who work year-round to make music happen. After a long break from regular programming due to the pandemic, there has been renewed interest in live music and Blue Skies in the Community has been very busy supporting music, musicians and the arts in the communities surrounding the festival site.

Blue Skies in the Community supports a number of programs. You may be familiar with some of them, like the **Blue Skies Community Fiddle Orchestra (page 25)** which you can see every year on the Main Stage! Some others are lesser known, like the choral sheet music lending library where your choir can borrow multiple copies of sheet music anytime! Some of our programs happen right here where our beloved festival is held. In the weeks before the festival, there are two camps held on site, the **Adult Music Camp** (AMC) and the **Blue Skies Kids Arts Camp**.



Drums, songs, games, laughter and joy filled the Blue Skies air this summer, thanks to the annual Blue Skies Kids Arts Camp. Co-directors Jenn Ayer and Janine DeVries-St.Jacques, along with their exceptional Instructors and Leadership Team, delivered an exciting, creative and caring experience for the campers. The majority of the children were from the local area, including fifteen bursary recipients selected by the schools located close to the Blue Skies Music Festival site.

# Respect, care and kindness

We all contribute to making Blue Skies the magical festival we look forward to all year long. One of the simplest and best ways to maintain the good vibes is by **respecting people's boundaries and only touching people with their consent**. People aren't always comfortable with being touched, so if you're not sure, just **ask before hugging or touching someone**, and be ready to accept it if they're not interested.

Blue Skies is at its best when everyone feels completely free to be themselves. Behaviours that are ableist, homophobic, racist, sexist, transphobic, otherwise prejudiced, aggressive, disrespectful or unkind can cast a shadow on someone's Blue Skies experience and the hurt can linger long after the festival. Let's try to be mindful of the effect that our words and actions have on the people around us. This goes for everyone at the festival: organizers, volunteers, sound crew, and performers included.

Being aware of what's happening around you is also a great way to be helpful to others. If you experience or witness harassment, assault, or disrespectful or otherwise harmful behaviour, you're encouraged to ask for it to stop, to intervene if it is safe to do so, and to communicate the situation to Security as soon as you can.

The Info Booth is a friendly place that is staffed day and night, and is ready to welcome you throughout the festival. The volunteers at the Info Booth will help connect you with Security, First Aid, or anyone else you need to help you deal with situations that you aren't comfortable handling on your own.

The Security team will follow up on every report of harmful behaviour and remain involved until it's resolved. On rare occasions, when resolving a situation calls for removing someone from the festival, that's what we d0.

# Poison Ivy - "Leaves of three - Let it be"

Tread carefully along the edges of the roads, fields and meadows. Poison ivy likes the margins, so keep your eyes out for those pesky little three-leafed devils. If you think you've come in contact with poison ivy, wash your skin with soap and water as soon as you can. The oil will stay on fabric and spread, so change your clothes and handle them carefully until they can be washed. If you do get a rash, First Aid can help.

# Ta Da! The No Garbage Blue Skies! Thanks to you!

There is no garbage pick-up or removal at Blue Skies! **Any garbage you bring in, you'll need to take home with you, after the Festival.** We will still handle your recycling and compost, though. Please take your recycling, bottles and compost to the Recycling Depot at the Inner Parking Lot.

Compost and recycling hours:

Saturday and Sunday:

8:30 - 10:30 am, 1 - 3 pm, and 6:30 - 8:30 pm

Monday: 8 am to 1 pm

Compost is left-over food stuff, even bones. Recyclables are: aluminum, tin, glass, corrugated cardboard, boxboard, non-glossy paper, and plastics (recyclable numbers 1 through 7).

Everything else is garbage, and here's the important part: **you must take ALL your garbage home with you**. Keep your garbage in a sealed container so you don't attract critters to your campsite!

The message truly is: Bring it in - Take it home!

# Beer, Wine, and Alcohol Bottle and Can Recycling

Each year Blue Skies selects a non-profit charitable organization to collect the bottles and cans and receive the revenue from the returns. The beneficiary for this year is the **Guatemala Stove Project**. The collection happens at the Main Depot, by the Inner Parking Lot. So donate your bottles and cans! Think about where they came from. If they are the type that can be returned to The Beer Store, they will benefit the GSP. Others go to recycling — if you're not sure, the people at recycling can help.

#### **Critters and Blue Skies**

The Blue Skies site is home to a huge variety of critters large and small, from dragonflies to raccoons, deer, and even bears.

This means we have to be a little aware. Critters love to eat, so here are some things that can encourage them to dine elsewhere:

- keep all food in a sealed cooler or container, especially overnight;
- **keep your garbage in a sealed container** so that it does not attract critters to your campsite;
- regularly bring your compost and sorted recycling to the recycling depot and wash your dishes regularly;
- make your tent a food-free zone, and keep toiletries, including toothpaste and shampoo, in a sealed container outside your tent.
